Minutes of Brooke Annual Parish Meeting held at Brooke Methodist Hall on Monday 11th May 2015 at 7.30pm.

The Chairman of the Parish Council, Mr Edward Jinks welcomed the Clerk and 8 members of the Parish to the meeting.

1. PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Mr Jinks gave his report, a copy of which is attached as an addendum to these Minutes.

The new housing development on Norwich Rd was discussed, including some concern about the apparent relocation of topsoil and subsoil from the development site onto adjoining land. The Clerk agreed to ask the developer to advise what is happening with the topsoil and subsoil generated by the new development.

2. POLICE REPORT

There were no Police representatives available to attend the meeting and they had therefore emailed the annual crime statistics to be read out on their behalf. These are attached as an addendum to the minutes.

3. DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Mr Fuller (District Councillor) was unable to attend the meeting and did not submit a report.

4. BROOKE SCHOOL REPORT

Mrs Laura Reynolds gave her report as a representative from the Brooke Primary School Governors.

There are currently 125 children attending the school. The new school minibus has been a great success, it is being used for various enriching activities such as transport to sporting fixtures and to the newly set up forest school. The forest school has also been a great success, providing children with the opportunity to take part in educational activities outdoors. The school has installed new kitchens during the last year and all meals are now cooked on site using locally sourced ingredients. There has been huge take up for these school dinners with around 80-90 meals being served up daily. Mr Jinks sampled the new school meals upon invitation along with other representatives of local organisations and declared them to be excellent. As the school is a faith school, it was subject to a SIAMS inspection recently and was declared to be 'Good with outstanding features'. Plans for the building of a new school are still going ahead. Funding has been approved and a site is being discussed. The current play area in the playground has been deemed to be dangerous and is roped off. The PTFA and Governors have initiated various fund raising schemes to raise the money for new equipment. This new equipment will be moved to the new school once it is built. To date, £10,000 has already been raised. The School has made a Crowdfunder video which is now live. The target to raise from this is £3,500. The money pledged will only be received if the target is met by the deadline of 21st June 2015.

5. BROOKE HOMEWATCH REPORT

Bob Powell was unable to attend the meeting so Liz Powell read his report on his behalf:

Although Brooke is a low crime area, there were thefts from oil tanks, bicycles taken from garden sheds, articles removed from cars which had been left on display and a catalytic converter stolen from a car in Poringland.

Current Police advice is to mark all equipment in garden sheds and garages with bright paint, as well as locking the same securely with padlocks.

As the BBQ season approaches, all windows and doors should be closed and locked where appropriate when you are in your back garden – so much crime is opportunistic.

When advised by either the Police or residents of a particular crime which could be repeated, Mr Powell has put posters up around the village and in the Post Office.

Crimes in our area of South Norfolk recently include anti-social behaviour, burglary, criminal damage, theft and one drugs offence but only 2 of these occurred in or around Brooke.

As always, the number to telephone to report a crime is 101 for non-emergencies and for advice on security or to speak to our Crime Prevention Officer – Penny Turner. If you see a crime in progress or have a genuine emergency, you should ring 999.

Residents are encouraged to advise Mr Powell of any crimes after they have been reported to the police, so that he can alert the village, if appropriate.

6. VILLAGE SIGN

Mr Jinks had already covered this item within his report. A copy of the new design is attached as an addendum to this report.

7. MINUTES OF LAST ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 14TH APRIL 2014

The minutes of the last annual meeting were circulated and agreed to be a true record by all those present. The Chairman signed the minutes accordingly.

8. MATTERS ARISING

There were no matters arising.

9. OPEN FORUM

Mr Mears thanked members of the public for their support for the last South Norfolk Players production 'Confusions' which was a great success. There will be a new production in October 2015.

Planning

Planning applications

- 25 in 2014/15
 - o 20 (80%) recommended for approval (74% last year)
 - o 5 recommended for refusal
 - 6 The Street (out of scale with existing building)
 - 15 The Street (roof terrace)
 - 49 High Green (High Green Farm) see below
 - Brooke House (biomass boiler)
 - Mereside/Hunstead Lane see below
- 19 in 2013/14
- 18 in 2012/13
- 22 in 2011/12

81 High Green - investigations made about the building works in the rear garden. SNC advised that it is a stable and tack room which does not require p/p

Local Development Framework (the new Local Plan)

- PC made various comments during the LDF process
 - o No more than 20 new dwellings to be allocated
 - o current development boundary to be maintained
 - o scale and character of Brooke must be protected
 - o Brooke has limited infrastructure and services
 - o no new development in open countryside

Document published by SNP included:

- three recommended sites for new housing
 - two on Norwich Rd
 - one at High Green Farm
- Employment land at Howe pits
 - PC commented that any new development must not:
 - o be visible from the south
 - o adversely impact nearby houses
- Two previously suggested "alternative" sites for new housing were not included in the published document:
 - High Green/Astley Cooper Place
 - Hunstead Lane/Mereside

Three planning applications linked to the South Norfolk Local Development Framework

- Norwich Rd 12 dwellings
 - o PC recommended refusal on several points of detail
 - o some were reflected in the approved scheme
 - o houses under construction
 - o the developer attended the PC meeting in Nov 2014 the development is due to complete in Nov 2015
 - o the 30mph speed limit will be extended northwards
 - o the PC has no power to influence the marketing name for this development, which is "Kings Meadow"
 - o research by Ken Warman has revealed that the field was historically known as Kings Head field
- Land south of Mereside/Hunstead Lane 17 dwellings
 - o not in the proposed new village development boundary
 - o PC unhappy with the principle of developing this site, recommended refusal on various grounds
 - O appeal outstanding
- High Green Farm
 - PC recommended refusal due to over-development
 - P/A has been withdrawn

Public spaces and events

Meres

- Working party 18 April
 - o a good turnout 10 volunteers
 - o refreshments by Liz Powell
 - o Thanks to all helpers

The path between the Meres has been re-surfaced by a contractor (with funds from the BT wayleave receipt)

Tree survey

Survey competed by Simon Aylmer

There are no trees in a dangerous condition, but two were recommended for felling

Village sign area

Working party held on 28 June to cut back overgrown vegetation

PC has asked NCC to replace the public footpaths sign, situated opposite the village sign area, which is in poor repair and has become unsightly

Norwich Rd lay by

Cutting back done by NCC Fly-tipped concrete removed by SNC Litter bin reinstated by PC

Parish Council land ownership

- PC owns six pieces of land and leases one other
- · Five have been successfully registered
 - o Dovecote Close
 - o East Mere
 - o St Peters Road Play Area lease
 - o Village sign area
 - o Bus shelter
- Ongoing work with the Land Registry to register the remainder
 - o West Mere
 - o Brecon Rd
 - Land registry think the land is still owned by Pointer Builders, but it is not clear whether or not the company still exists
 - We are trying to contact the solicitor who is believed to have acted for Pointers, but so far without success

Village sign

- PC has been working on a design for the replacement village sign for a couple of years - it is in very poor condition and requires replacing
- PC competition for design ideas (reported in the Parish magazine) received three submissions (displayed at APM in 2013)
- Submission by Jane Mears was accepted
- Detailed design worked on with Harry Stebbings Workshop
- The final design was featured in a recent Parish Magazine, and is on display tonight
- the sign is being made now

Maintenance of village furniture

- The village furniture is in need of maintenance/re-treating
- PC has been unable to find a volunteer prepared to do this for no charge
- PC has appointed a contractor to do the maintenance

Grass cutting

- PC has had continuing problems with the performance of the contractors, who have not been cutting to the required standards, particularly at St Peters Rd play area
- John Ash and Keith Joad have met contractors on several occasions, which has resulted in an improved service
- we will be monitoring their performance during this year's growing season

Anglian Water

- AW offered £1,000 compensation for each community following the loss of water supply late last year (in addition to the £20 for each household)
- it was agreed that the £1,000 compensation should go to the Scout Hut refurbishment project

Super-fast broadband

- New BT cabinet has been installed at the Meres
- Super-fast Broadband is now available in most of Brooke
- Wayleave agreement signed, £750 income to PC

Finances
